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Thrift store gets face lift

WAUPUN - Seven years ago a lumber yard was transformed into a thrift store, Bargains Galore. Now another transformation is taking place as the thrift store expands to accommodate customers and volunteers.

The ground breaking ceremony was held last Saturday, April 19. About 250 people attended to cheer on the volunteers and committee members.

Announced during the ground breaking ceremony, Bargains Galore has raised \$1.5 million for the CWC schools.

"The goal is to be closed as little as possible," Pete Montsma, superintendent of the project, said at the ground breaking ceremony. Montsma has construction experience and is retired.

is so dependent upon volunteers and the weather, an approximate completion date of the project cannot be determined until progress is made.

The thrift store was first created as a fundraiser for the Central Wisconsin Christian School in Waupun. The store opened in August of 2001 as an option to pay for tuition for families attending the school. It started with volunteer management and all donated merchandise.

'We soon found out that the store was doing well." co-manager Brenda Hofman said. "The store was well-received in the community and developed quickly."

The store has kept the same schedule, open Thursday 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., Friday and Saturday 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

According to co-manager Melissa Wierenga, the store only sells quality merchandise. They accept donations during the same hours the store is open. During the week volunteers inventory the merchandise and put it out for display.

"Now it's huge," Wierenga said. "It's the talk of the town. It's become a big operation."

'Over the years we've been feeling the growing pains," Hofman said.

"That's what led us to pursue Project Renovate. We've been planning it over the last year and it has now come full circle.'

The renovation will be beneficial to both the customers and volunteers.

"We want to provide a better shopping experience," Hofman said. "And the renovation will affect the staff by improving the working conditions. Because it's volunteer-run, we need to have a nice, comfortable place for them to work."

The operation has about 200 volunteers with about 40 helping regularly every

"The volunteers do love it," Wierenga said. "They take pride in their work. It has been a good fit for people to use their talents.

The three managers helped plan the renovation project. Wierenga started as a volunteer when the store first began. She later became a volunteer department manager and assistant manager before her current co-manager posi-

Hofman was also a volunteer since the beginning and became a manager in 2002. Co-manager Jade Regnerus volunteered at the store before being moved to a managerial

position in January 2007.

"The business has changed a lot in the 6 1/2 years we've been in physical business," Wierenga said. "The store originally put stuff out and we'd see how it'd go. Now there a method to our madness.'

The store has been a member of the National Association of Resale and Thrift Shop stores for four

"It's a good resource for us," Hofman said. "It helped clarify a lot. None of us have a retail background, so we were thrilled to find a group to talk to throughout the challenges we go through.'

Over the years the store provided free merchandise to victims of fires or other catastrophes. They also hold a Community Day once a year where proceeds of one day's sales go to a community organization.

"People see it's making a difference for the community," Hofman said.

According to Wierenga, thrift stores usually only last five years.

"It's been a blessing that we've been as successful as we have in our seven years," Wierenga said.

WCI & Bargains Galore Launch "Dress for Success" Program

WAUPUN—With the help of Bargains Galore Thrift Store, Waupun Correctional Institution has put an end to the long standing practice of releasing inmates into the community wearing their "prison green's" (the stan-dard prison uniform) if no other clothing options were available. This practice did not match with the Department of Correction's recent Re-Entry Initiative, which focuses on better preparation of inmates for release. Inmates being better prepared for release means benefits for Wisconsin communities, as it can lead to lower recidivism rates and ultimately. safer communities. To transition out of prison successfully requires a bridge to the community. Partnerships between the Institutions, Parole Agents, and community resources is one way to build these bridges and are vital to a successful "Re-entry" into

the community. Waupun Correctional Institution approached Bargains Galore approximately two months ago to propose the idea of beginning a "clothing closet" at the Institution that would stock men's clothing, shoes and outerwear. As a result of the partnership, titled "Dress for Success," men released from prison will be able to have a better start for returning to their community. Initial impressions are important for these men. They will be making their initial impression on their Parole Agent and prospective employers. The partnership will provide one set of clothing, shoes and outerwear to each inmate who is unable to purchase these items for themselves and/or have no one on the outside who can assist them in obtaining clothing for release.

This year, Waupun Correctional Institution is currently projecting approximately 120 inmates who will be released back to their communities
