

Bargains Galore salutes volunteers: heart of success

A motorist driving by 810 W. Main St. in Waupun at about 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, Friday or Saturday might be puzzled by the sight. Here in the midst of a stubborn recession is a line of dozens of people waiting outside the Bargains Galore Thrift Store. Is this a rare event—like snow in the first week of April—or is the waiting crowd a regular thing?

The folks in line are bargain hunters in the best American tradition, lining up early for a chance to bag a one-of-a-kind item at a good price. People from every age group, occupation, and ethnicity make up the clientele.

Once the doors open, some hurry straight for the clothing department, where a single mother can tell you,

“I can come in here with \$20 and buy a lot of clothes for my kids.” Other shoppers, not quite so rushed, check what’s available in the crafts, books and music, or antiques department.

Each item in the store is unique, in that once it’s sold, it’s gone. Some shoppers move quickly, scanning the ever-changing inventory for that special deal that will become bragging rights, once they get it home.

The surprise for another shopper might be running into an old neighbor or a long lost friend. “Where ya

been all winter?” These conversations can spin on for a half hour before anybody notices.

If you’re in a really talkative mood there’s even a snack bar where you can sit awhile and have a cup of coffee. Bargains Galore is a spacious 20,000 sq. ft facility, attractively decorated and state of the art in terms of organization and efficiency.

How and why does this all happen? The store is only open 18 hours per week. That would seem like a poor marketing strategy to the big box store executives, but at Bargains Galore, everything works according to a unique, well-developed plan.

At the heart of the plan are Volunteers, 185 of them to be exact. They are the story behind the store. What better time to recognize those who make a difference than during this National Volunteer Appreciation Week. And while each Volunteer makes some type of sacrifice, there’s nothing half-hearted about their belief in the store’s Mission. It has to do with the end result. The goal is community enrichment by way of Christian education.


Carol Jansma, sorting through a colorful mountain of newly-arrived clothing, explains: “All four of my kids went through the Christian Schools, and now I have two grandchildren there also.” She works from 7 to 11 a.m., carefully checking each item, putting aside anything missing a button or needing a new zipper, etc.

be as quick and easy as drive-thru service at a fast food restaurant. She’s one of only four paid employees at Bargains Galore, and shares her philosophy on donations: “We can use most anything. As long as it’s in good shape, somebody can use it.”

And if something needs a bit of tinkering, the ‘boys next door’ at the repair shop can tackle just about anything that plugs in, lights up, or makes noise. Sid Soodsma has been on board since 2001, when he retired from farming and 39 years at Silgan Containers. “I check all the electrical items that come in, and make a note on the ticket if there’s anything wrong.”

He hadn’t planned on doing this type of work in ‘retirement,’ but, like many a good husband would say, “My wife got me involved. Before I started here I was never in a thrift store.”

Bargains Galore is many things to many people. Another Volunteer, Audrey Zamzow, sorts items from cardboard boxes delivered to her counter by LeAnne. “Joyce Haan and I were friends before we started working at this, but now we’ve gotten to know each other even better. It’s great.”

Behind Audrey along the wall is a tall ‘cage’ that’s labeled “Stuffed Animals.” It provides ‘temporary shelter’ to a menagerie that would rival Noah’s passenger list on the Ark. “I used to take all the animals home, wash them, and hang them out to dry on the clothesline.” Did her neighbors wonder at the sight of this? That question will have to remain a part of the Bargains Galore puzzle.

People wait in a checkout line, which turns back and forth like a corn maze. Its design provides the most democratic system for the shopper waiting, and makes the most efficient use of floor space.

Cashier Alice Posthuma takes interest in where the customers come from. “If I’ve never seen them before I like to ask. This week

we’ve had people from Fond du Lac, Horicon, Ripon, Fairwater, and Markesan.” Just to name a few. And Bargains Galore is always ready to serve a wider audience.

The Mission Statement is prominently displayed on the wall behind the cashiers. It starts with a box of items you might not need, and the Volunteers make something wonderful happen. The students of Central Wisconsin Christian Schools, their families and the community receive the best of benefits.
